- 7. Finding the area of a region described by a polar curve or curves.
- 8. Complex numbers:
 - (a) Polar form of a complex number
 - (b) De Moivre's Formula and Euler's Formula
 - (c) Finding n^{th} powers and n^{th} roots of real and complex numbers.
 - (d) Complex exponentials
 - (e) Integration using complex exponentials.
- 9. Improper integrals (Section 7.6)
 - (a) Determining whether an improper integral converges or diverges.
 - (b) Computing improper integrals using the limit definition.

- 10. Convergence of series:
 - (a) Divergence Test
 - (b) Integral Test
 - (c) Comparison Test
 - (d) Limit Comparison Test
